







The mission of AID Atlanta is to reduce new HIV infections and improve the quality of life of its members and the community by breaking barriers and building community.





We saw a 4% increase in our combined HCC census in comparison to 2019.



There was an improved viral load suppression rate by 1%, representing 1,925 patients.



There was a 23% increase in retention to HIV medical care among members served via non-clinical services and a 5% increase in the number of those who are virally suppressed.



2020 Key Updates



There was a 20% increase in the number of active participants on PrEP, meaning they had labs AND accessed their PrEP meds within the last 90 days.



Although there was a decrease in the number of HIV tests administered due to the pandemic, we sustained our 80% linkage rate connecting those newly diagnosed to HIV medical care.




A 55% increase in the number of Information Hotline encounters resulted in 27,615 encounters over the year.



Over 13,000 HIV Tests Provided

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- 1% of those tested for HIV, had a positive test result (182)
- 80% of those diagnosed with HIV, were linked to medical care within 30 days (146)
- 98% of patients with HIV were prescribed ART during the reporting year (2380)
- 81% of patients with \geq 1 med visit, had a viral load < 200 at last vl test during the reporting year (1925)








