Tobacco Georgia

- Leading preventable cause of death in Georgia
 - More than 10,000 people die each year due to tobacco
 - That is 1 in 6 deaths which are attributable to tobacco
 - Causes heart disease and cancer
 - Lung cancer is the leading type of cancer
- Georgia ranks 30th among all states
 - 1.5 million adults smoke
 - About 21.2 percent of adults (2011)
 - An additional 317,000 use smokeless tobacco
- Tobacco use has been linked to other chronic diseases with a high burden in Georgia, such as diabetes

Tobacco Georgia

- Tobacco use has been linked to other chronic diseases with a high burden in Georgia, such as diabetes
- Tobacco use is a serious problem in young people in our state, and is not declining
 - Most lifelong smokers started before age 14
 - Approximately 25% of 18-24 year olds smoke
 - More young adults who smoke have asthma (21 v 6%)
 - Youth using alternative forms of tobacco (e.g. hookah)
 - New research suggesting e-cigarettes may be a gateway product

HEALTH IMPROVES WITH TIME

20 Minutes After Quitting Your heart rate drops.

2 Weeks to 3 Months After Quitting Heart attack risk begins to drop. Lung function begins to improve.

1 to 9 Months After Quitting Coughing and shortness of breath decrease

1 Year After Quitting Added risk of coronary heart disease is half that of a smoker's.

Within 5 Years of Quitting

bladder is cut in half.

10 Years After Quitting Risk of dying from lung cancer drops by half.

Helpful quitting tips/techniques &

Callers receive FRFF-

- A personalized Quit Plan, self-help
 materials and "Quit" kit
- Current information about local tobacco cessation support groups and resources.
- Current information about Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved medicines that can help with cessation.

Callers are encouraged to speak with their physician, pharmacist and nurse about safe and effective options to help with quitting.

2012-2013 Georgia Tobacco Quitline Evaluation

- Callers between July 1, 2012 and January 2013 enrolled in a one call or 4 call program
- Assessment, Quit coach session, Quit Guide, Web Coach, local support referrals, and 4 week supply of free NRT
- Sample N=826, 33.1 percent response rate
- Respondent characteristics
 - 74 percent of respondents were long term tobacco users
 - 61 percent had at least one chronic condition
 - 26 percent on Medicaid
 - 72 percent were heavily tobacco dependent
 - Half reported exposure to tobacco use at work or home

2012-2013 Georgia Tobacco Quitline Evaluation

At the time of follow up 7 months after enrollment, 31 percent of all respondents had been tobacco-free for 30 days or longer

Duration without Tobacco	Percent of Respondents
24 hours or longer	41 percent
7 days or longer	37 percent
30 days or longer	31 percent

- 2/3 used pharmacotherapies
- NRT use associated with 6 month quit rates
- 78 percent reported only using GTQL services
- 91 percent were satisfied with GTQL
- Among those who did not quit, less tobacco dependence

Help Your Patients Quit Smoking

ASK all patients about tobacco use during each visit.

ADVISE them about the benefits of tobacco cessation.

Save time, streamline processes and help your patients get healthy by following these simple steps:

- Step 1 Query your system for patients with the following ICD9 codes:
 - · 305.1 Tobacco use disorder; Tobacco dependence
 - Tobacco use disorder in pregnancy (649.0)
- Step 2 Under CPT Category I Code Smoking and tobacco-use cessation counseling

If the patient screened positive for tobacco use and counseling was provided, enter one of the following codes: 99406: Smoking/tobacco counseling (3-10 minutes) 99407: Smoking/tobacco counseling (>10 minutes)

- Step 3 Review and complete the Georgia Tobacco Quit Line Health Care Fax Referral Form. Remember to get the patient's consent and signature.
- Step 4 Fax the completed form to 1-800-483-3114.



Tobacco-Free K-12 School Districts

- Total number of children protected to 1,288,154 across 1,692 schools within 97 of Georgia's 181 school districts

- Tobacco-free DPH Policy
 - Prohibits tobacco use in DPH owned and controlled facilities and vehicles at all times, effective 3/30/2014
- Statewide Tobacco Plan Early Summer 2014
 - Tobacco Partnership
 - DPH Tobacco Advisory Council
- Areas of Focus
 - Tobacco-free colleges and universities
 - Insurer reimbursement for Quitline services
 - Cessation services for the Medicaid population
 - Quitline and evidence-based cessation for SHBP members
 - Ask, Advise and Refer implementation in clinical settings
 - Local smoke-free indoor air ordinances
 - Tobacco-free places, including homes




