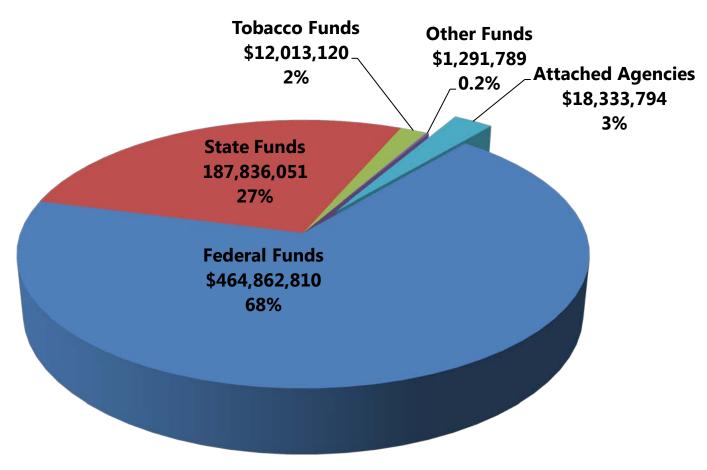

# What is Sequestration?

- \$85 B in across the board budget cuts to Federal agencies
- Came about as a result of the Budget Control Act of 2011 (Debt Ceiling Compromise)
- Some items exempt, e.g. Vaccines for Children

Two Sequestrations— 3/1/13 and 3/27/13

# Impact to Georgia Public Health

Total impact unknown
 – Federal
 agencies have flexibility in what items
 to cut in their budget

 Have received notice from CDC that "it is possible" that our awards may be subject to reduction

### Where to Go From Here?

Will use estimates for major grants to plan expenditures

- Budgetary Guiding Principles will be used:
  - Unique Services
  - Strategic Plan Priorities
  - Maintain Matching and MOE requirements
  - Statutory Requirements
