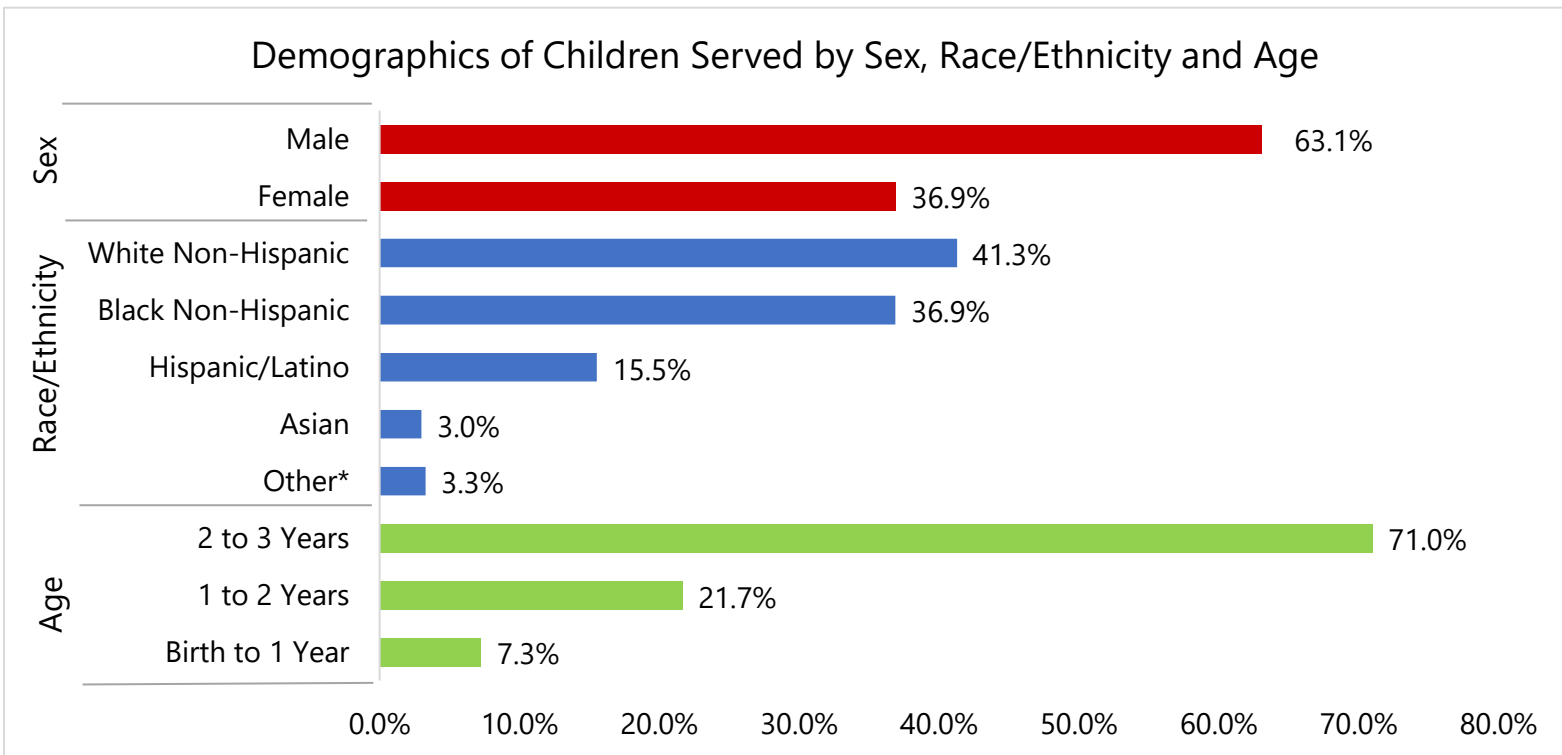

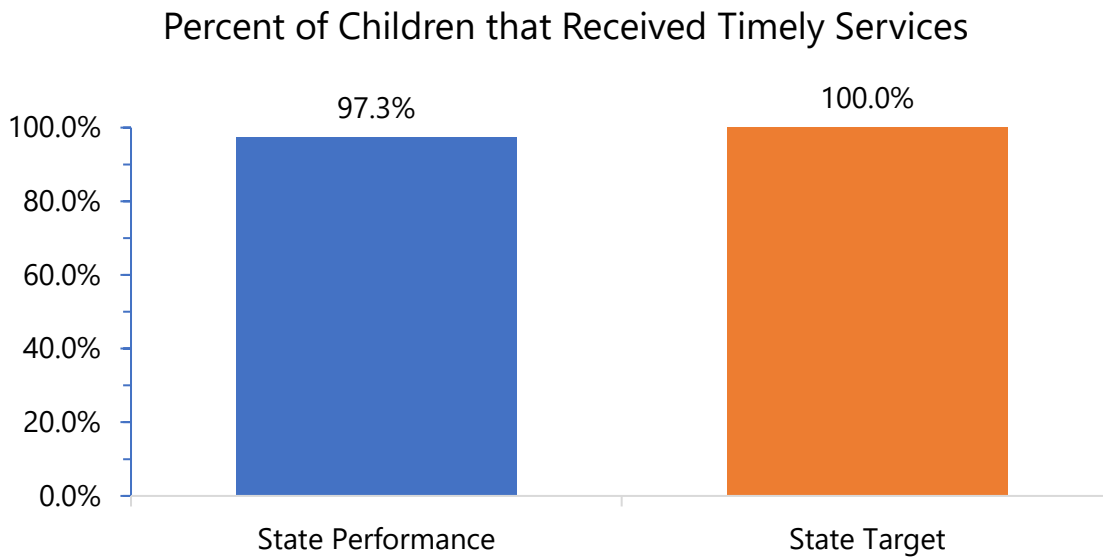
In FFY 2023, a total of 17,538 children ages birth to 3 years received early intervention services through the Georgia Part C Babies Can't Wait Program

Percent of infants and toddlers with IFSPs who receive early intervention services on their IFSPs in a timely\* manner

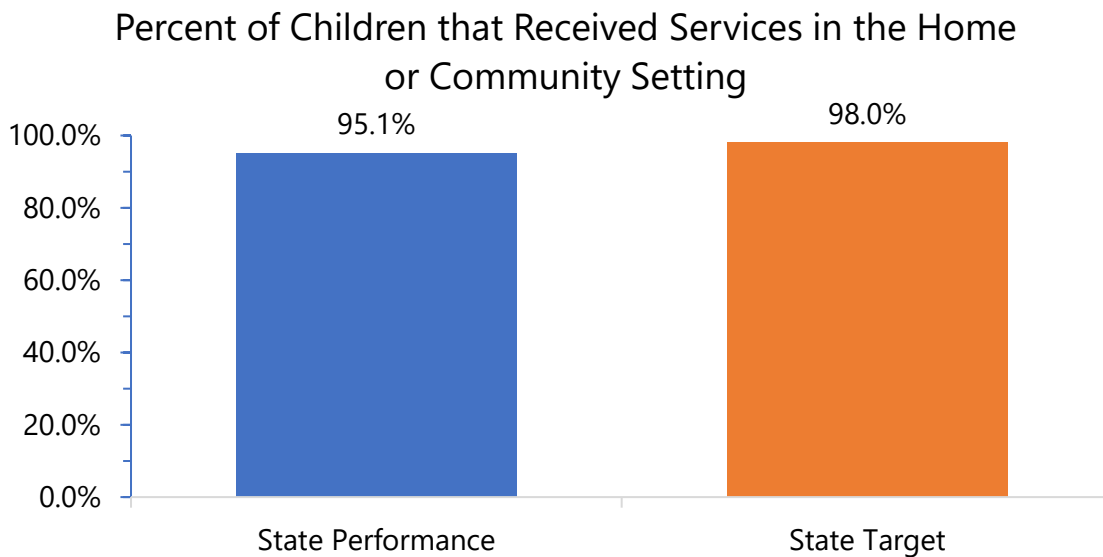

Percent of infants and toddlers with IFSPs who primarily receive early intervention services in the home or community-based settings as of 12/1/2023



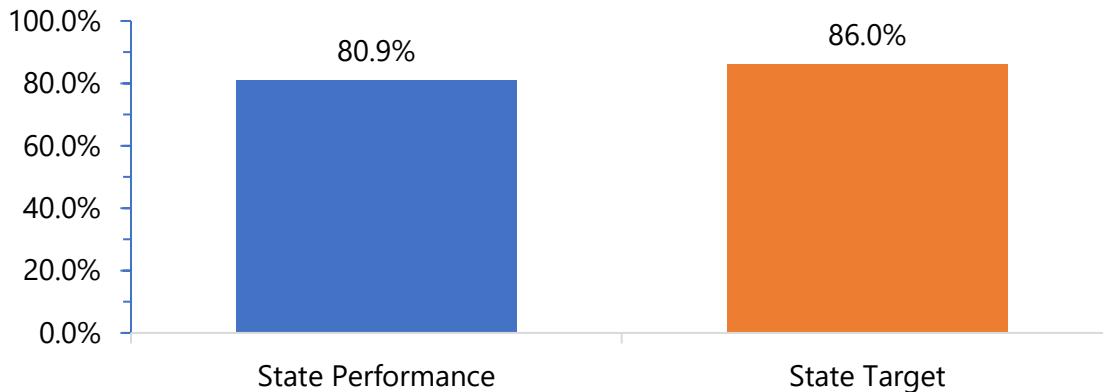

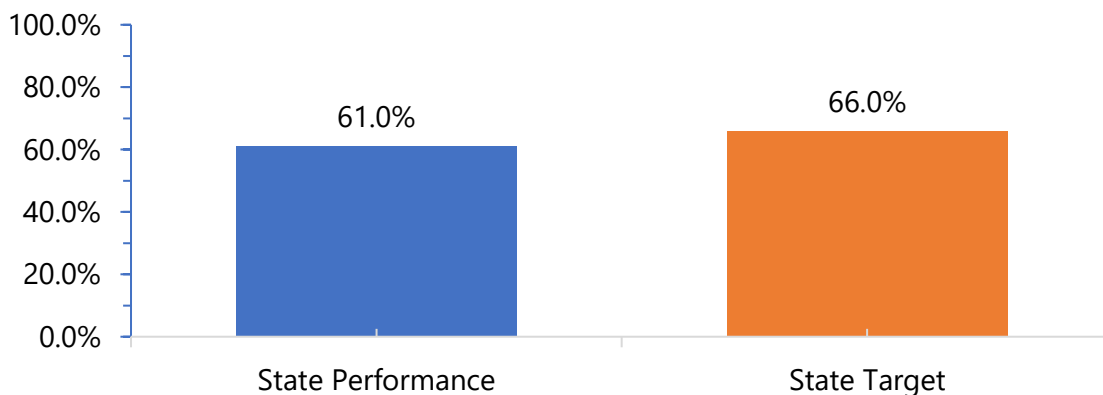
Percent of Children with Substantial Increase in Rate of Growth in Positive Social – Emotional Skills by Age 3 or Program Exit

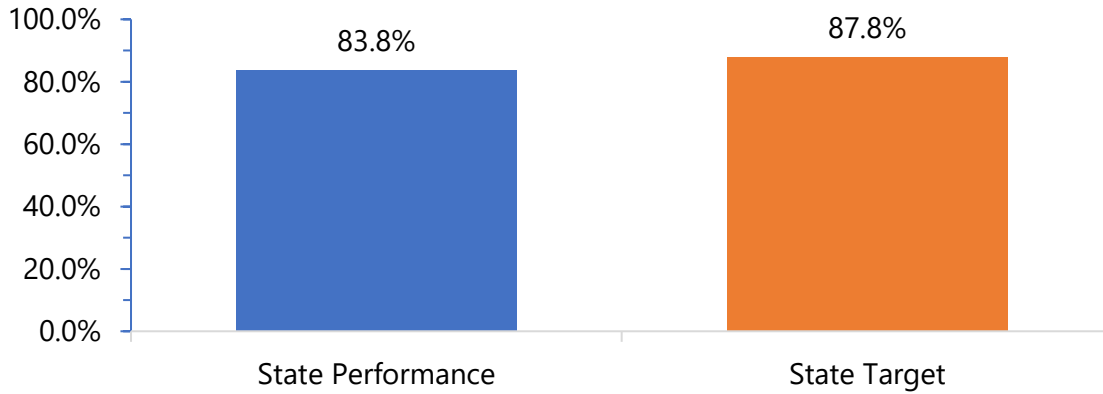
Percent of Children Functioning within Age Expectation in Positive Social – Emotional Skills by Age 3 or Program Exit

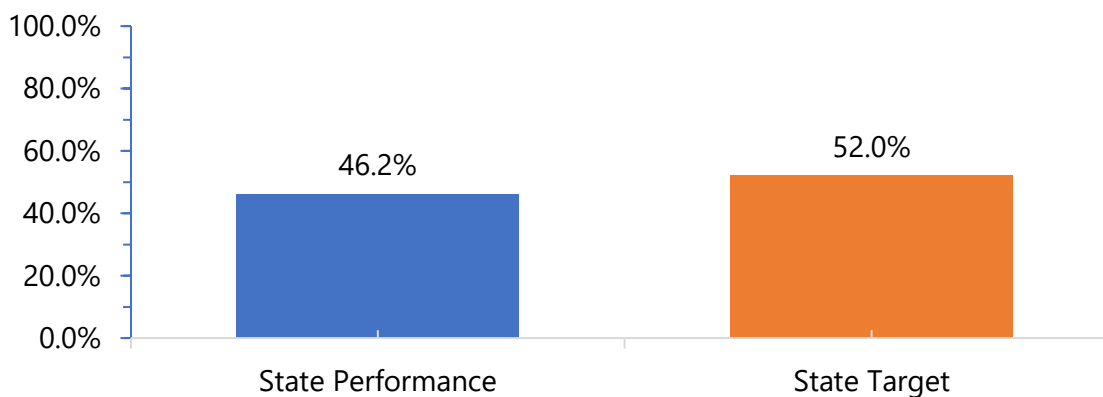
Percent of Children with Substantial Increase in Rate of Growth in Acquisition and Use of Knowledge and Skills by Age 3 or Program Exit

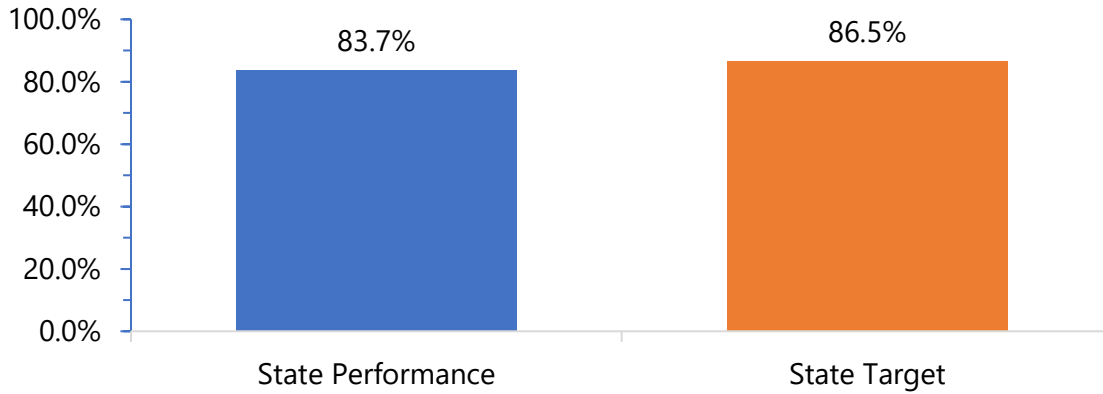
Percent of Children Functioning within Age Expectation in Acquisition and Use of Knowledge and Skills by Age 3 or Program Exit

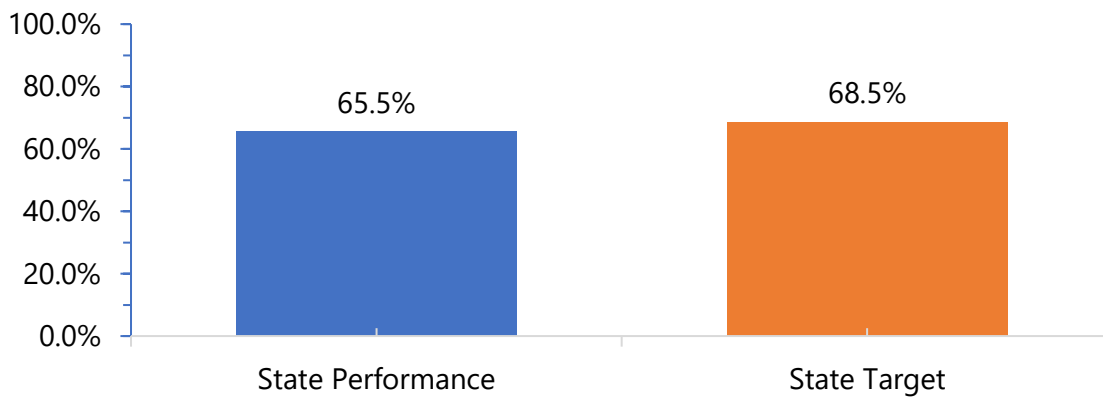
Percent of Children with Substantial Increase in Rate of Growth in Use of Appropriate Behaviors to Meet their Needs by Age 3 or Program Exit

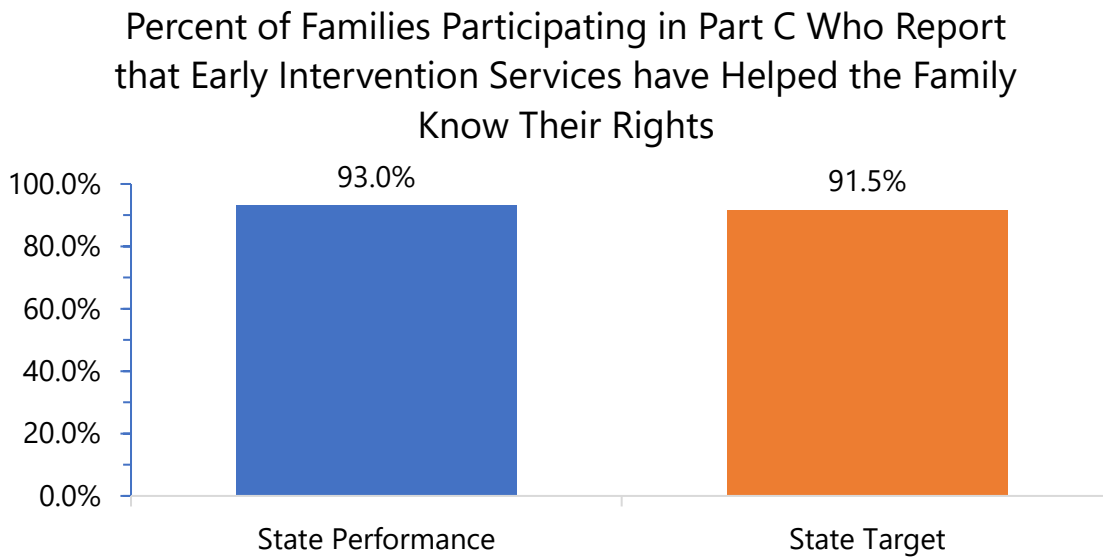
Percent of Children Functioning within Age Expectation in Use of Appropriate Behaviors to Meet their Needs by Age 3 or Program Exit



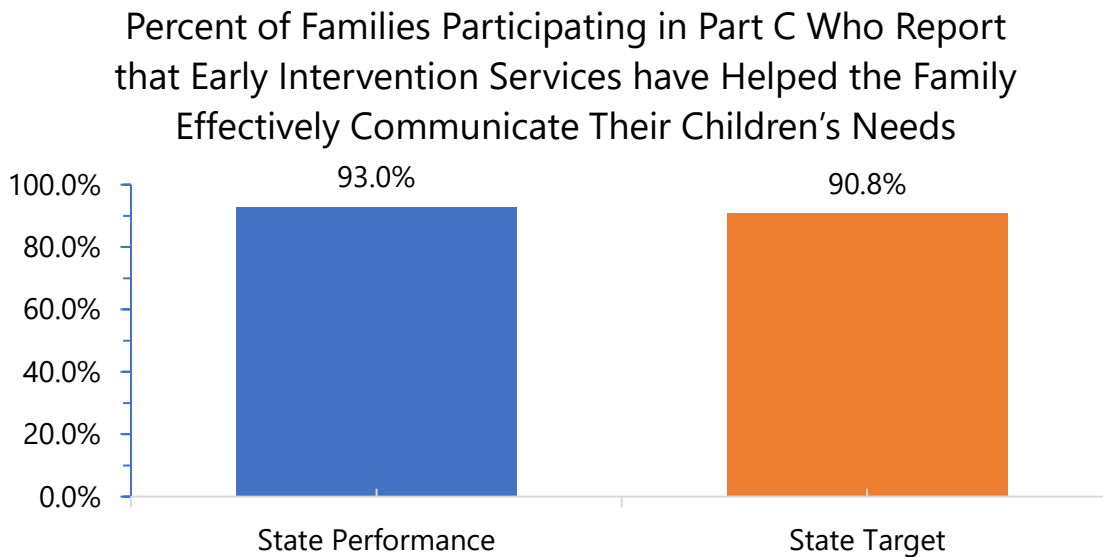

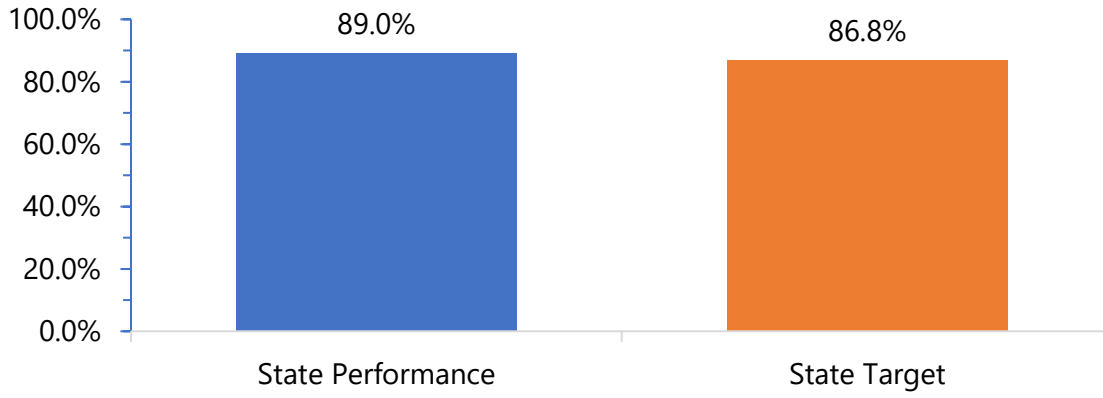


B. Percent of families who report that early intervention services have helped the family to effectively communicate their children's needs

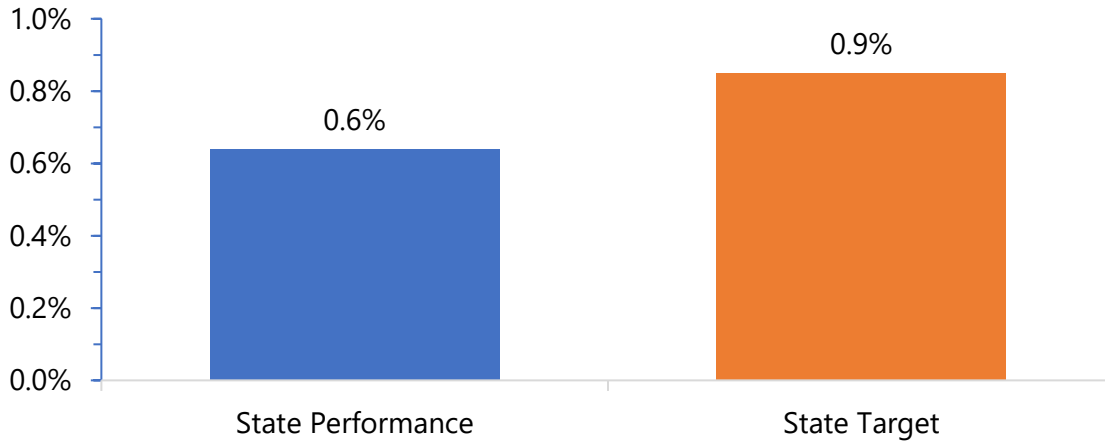
Percent of Families Participating in Part C Who Report that Early Intervention Services have Helped the Family Help Their Children Develop and Learn

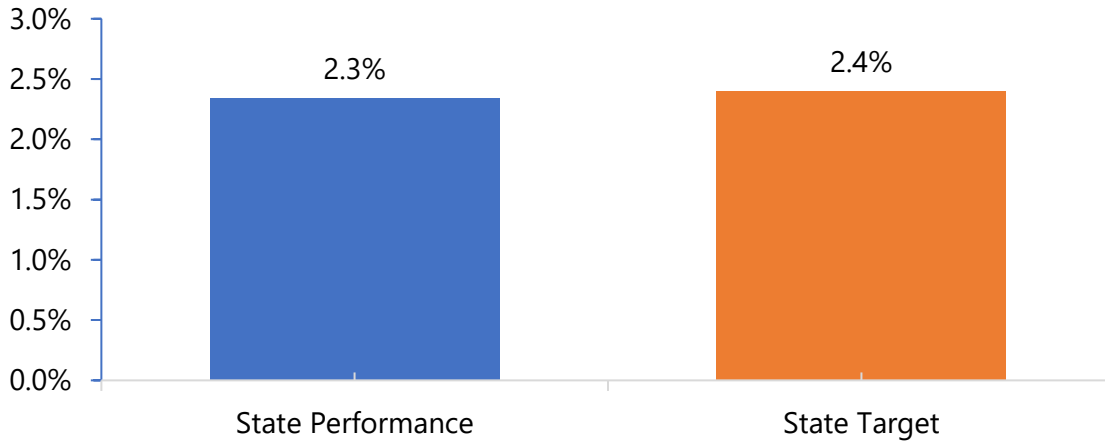

Percent of Infants Ages Birth to Three with IFSPs compared to National Data



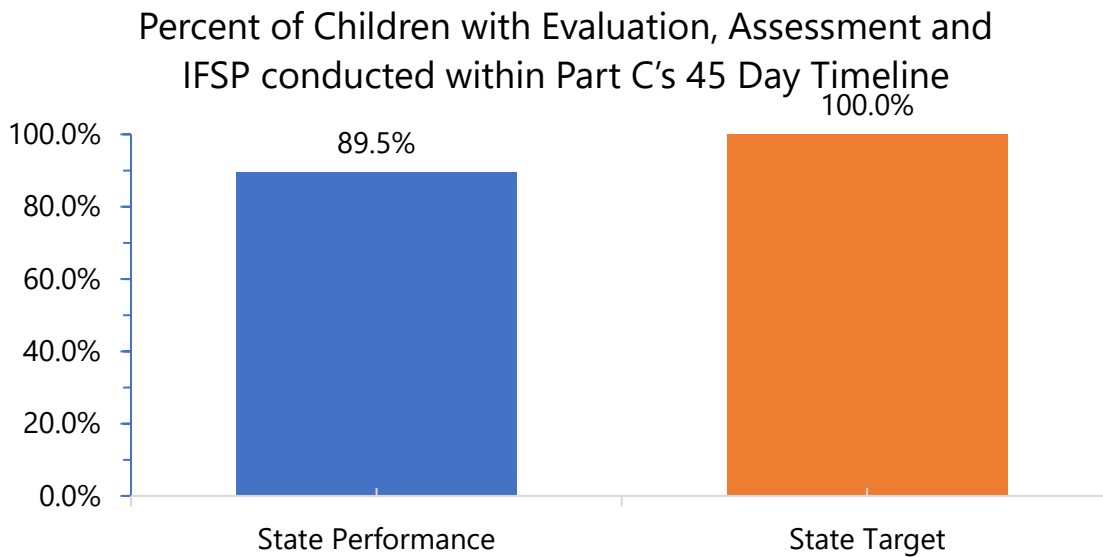

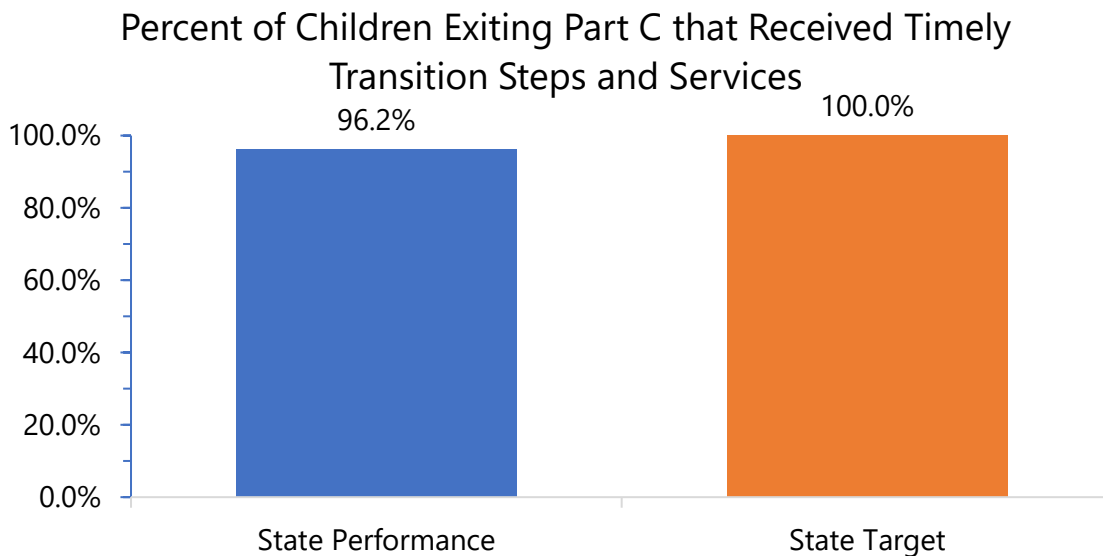
Percent of infants and toddlers with IFSPs for whom an evaluation and assessment and an initial IFSP meeting were conducted within Part C’s 45-day timeline

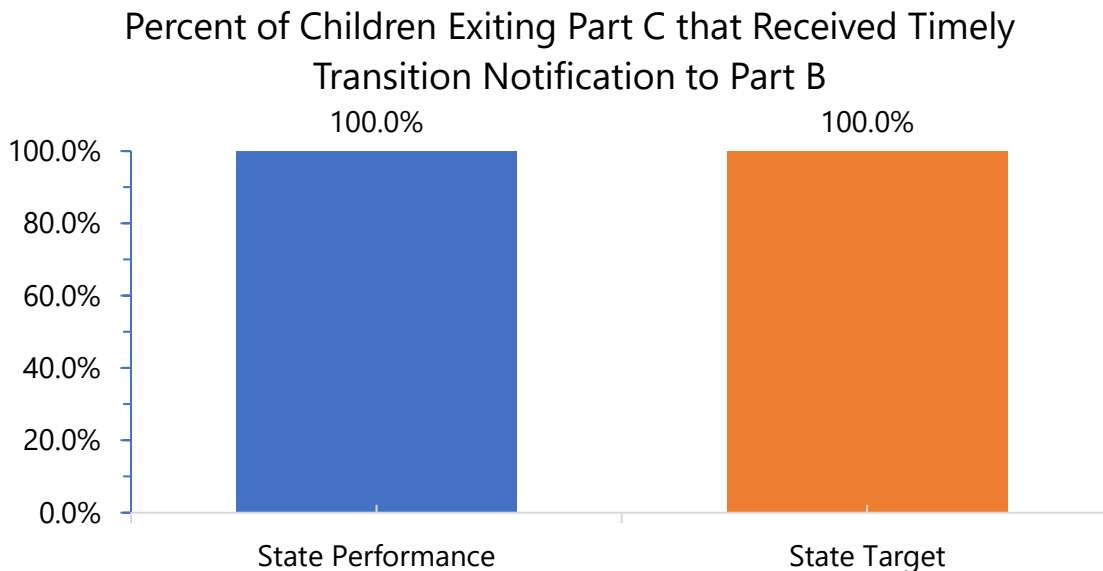
A. Percent of children exiting Part C that received timely\* transition steps and services

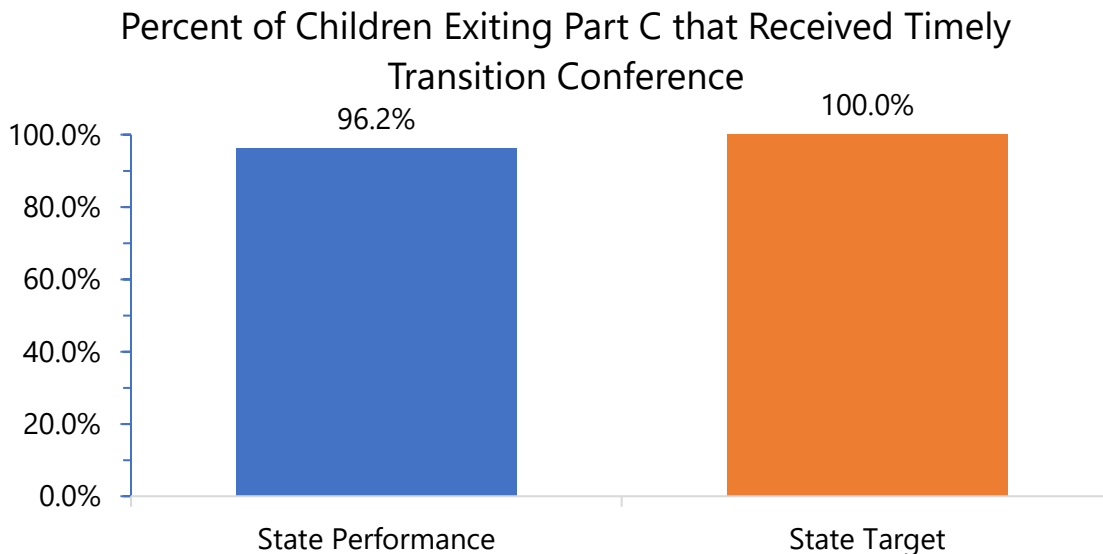
