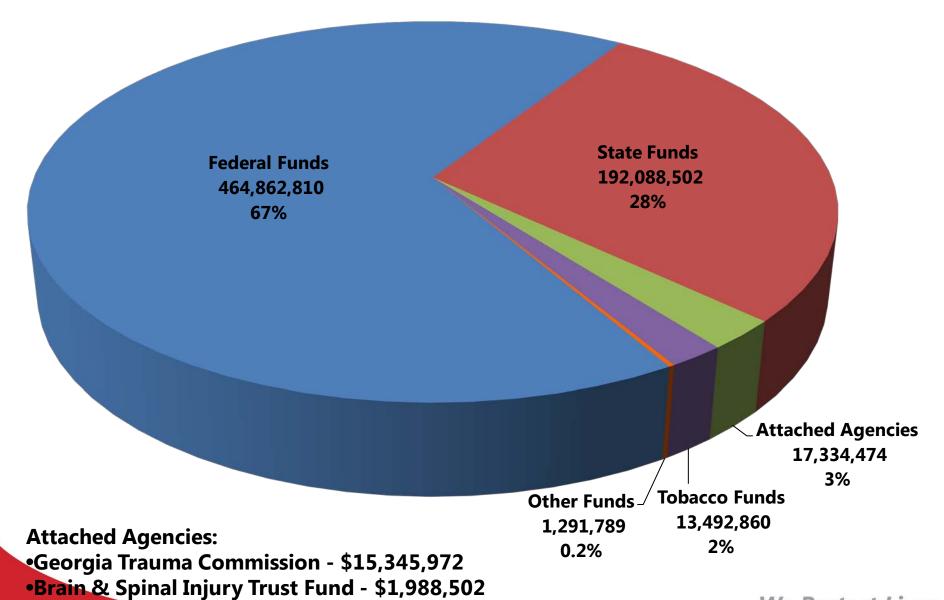

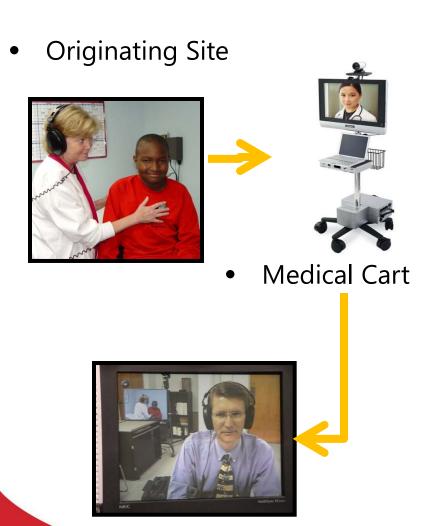

Telemedicine vs. Telehealth

- Telemedicine The use of medical information exchange from one site to another via electronic communications.
 Two-way, real time interactive audio and video telecommunication equipment
- Telehealth- The use of telecommunication technologies for clinical care, patient teachings and home health, health professional education, administrative and program planning

Telemedicine Overview



- Originating Site the actual location where a patients is located
- Medical Cart interactive and secure telecommunications system
- Distant Site The site where physician or practitioner is located

Uses of Telehealth (Videoconferencing)

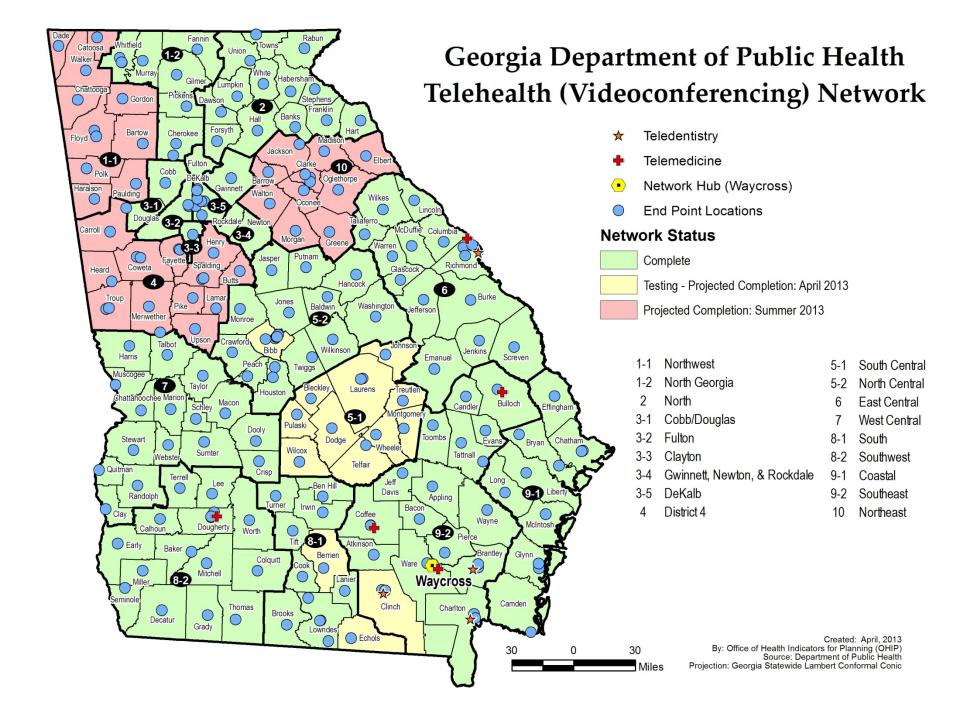
- Administrative employment interviews, staff meetings, updates, conferences;
- **Emergency Preparedness** virtual District Operations Center, community partner engagement, planning, and communication, training;
- Infectious Disease specialty clinical care for HIV/AIDS patients;
- **Nutrition/WIC** individual education, consultation, breastfeeding support, and recorded training sessions;
- Pediatric Specialty Clinics asthma/allergy, developmental, genetics, and neurosurgery; and
- Workforce Development Human Resources updates, and training.

Benefits of Telehealth

- Decreased travel and lost wages for patients
- Better utilization of work time and decreased travel costs for staff
- Access to specialty services and training not available in rural settings
- Reaches populations that may otherwise never receive services
- High patient satisfaction

Our Goals

- Increase capacity of telemedicine facility sites state-wide
 - ➤ Implement Telehealth in each of the state's 18 Public Health Districts and all 159 counties
- Increase access to care:
 - Address the state's most pressing health challenges, including infant mortality, oral health and obesity and associated diseases
 - Connect Georgians with the specialized care they need that may not exist in every community, like diagnosis and treatment of stroke patients, evaluations for autism or appropriate monitoring of a high-risk pregnancy



New Telehealth Projects

- **Albany** high risk OB clinic connecting Dougherty Co. Health Dept. with Women's Telehealth in Atlanta
- Valdosta HRSA grant project for development of children's network

Training

Training for all staff

- Basic training will be offered to each site approximately 1 hour onsite session; focus on "hands on" use of equipment
- During the site visit, complete inventory of all videoconferencing equipment will be taken along with photographs
- Each district will be asked to identify 1 Telehealth Coordinator;
 training will be provided by Office of Workforce Development

Albany project training (4/11 & 4/12)

Launching a high risk obstetrical telemedicine clinic (Centering Pregnancy)

Pilot/Needs Assessment

- 14 clinical carts were purchased for deployment (13 into districts, 1 at Waycross hub)
- A survey was completed by District Health Directors about interest in having a cart placed within their district and potential uses
- In the process of reviewing results

ASTHO Grant

- \$25,000 Grant
- Needs Assessment
- Partnership and Collaboration (Meetings 5/3 & 6/6)
- Expanding Telemedicine in Georgia
- Goal: develop a sustainable business model
