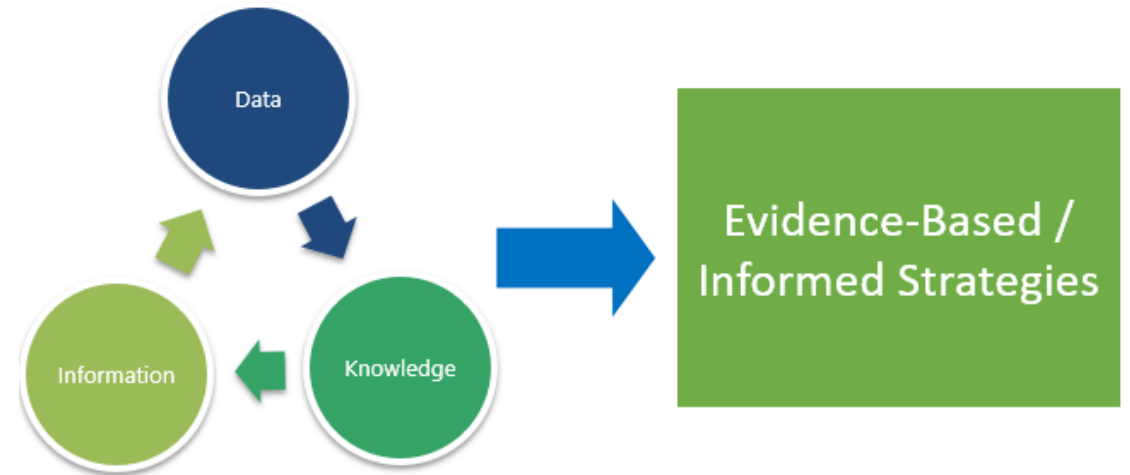

What is Title V ?

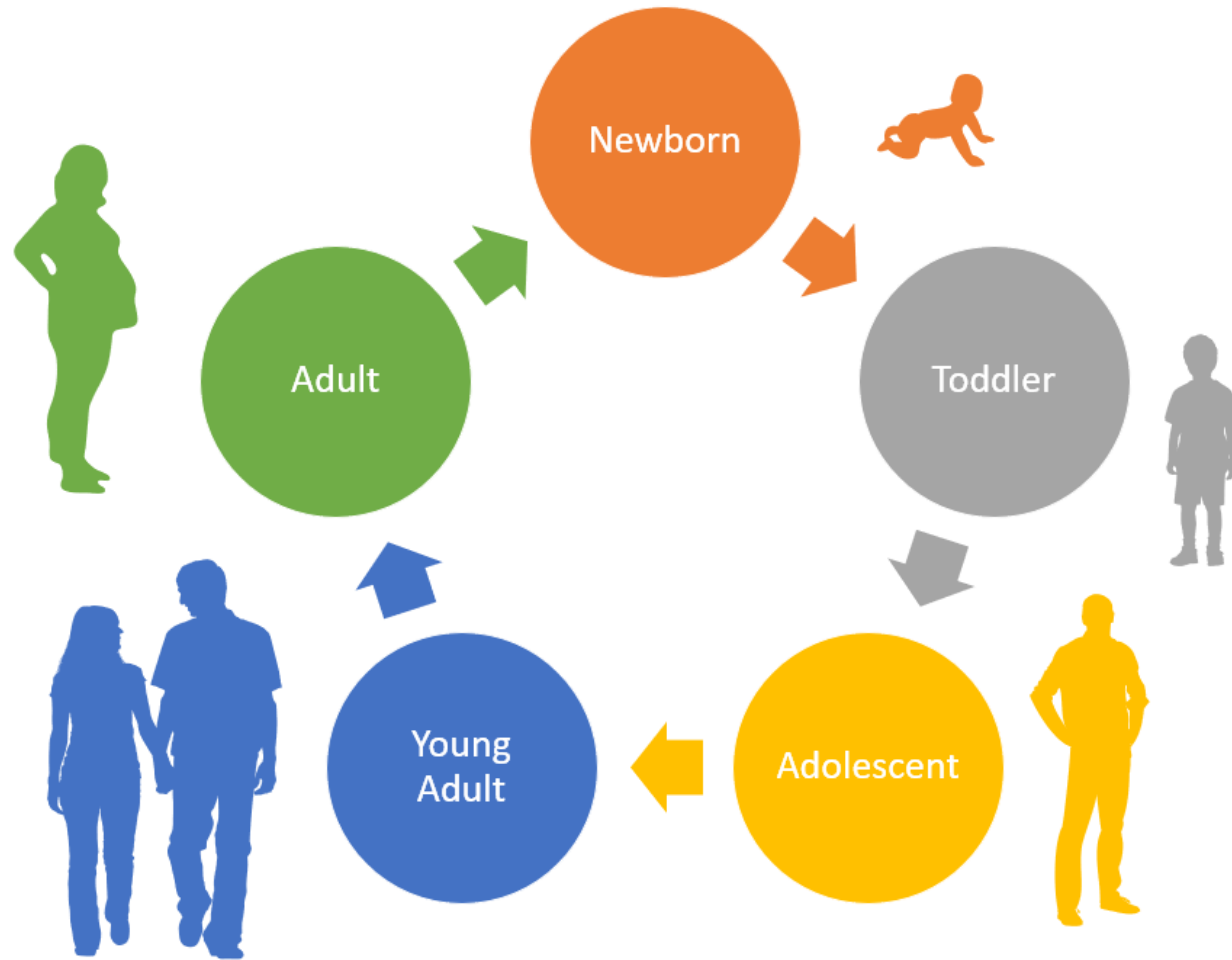
- The Nation's oldest federal-state partnership to improve the health of all mothers, children, and youth including children and youth with special health care needs and their families.
- The Title V Block Grant is funded by the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA)

The intentional practice of working with families for the ultimate goal of positive outcomes in all areas through the life-course.

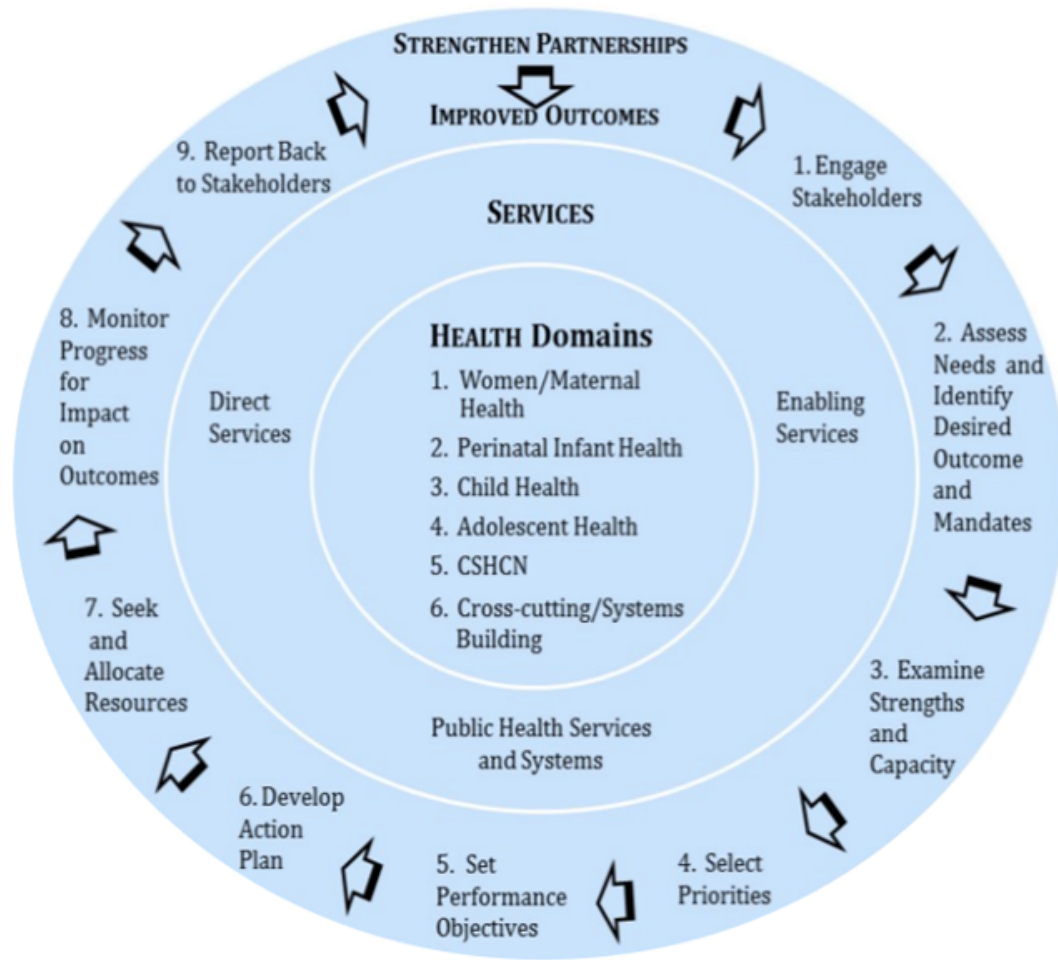


Five-year Needs Assessment

- Conducted every five years
- Accurate and complete picture of the strengths and weaknesses of a state's public health system
- Inform priorities, understand gaps, and set the agenda
- Understand, allocate, and develop available resources to meet needs
- Improve maternal, child, family, and community health outcomes

Five-Year Needs Assessment Process

- 14-16 Month Process
- Goals, framework, methodology of programs
- Focus Groups
- Community and stakeholder engagement
- Quantitative and qualitative methods used to assess strengths and needs of each population health domain, MCH program capacity and partnerships

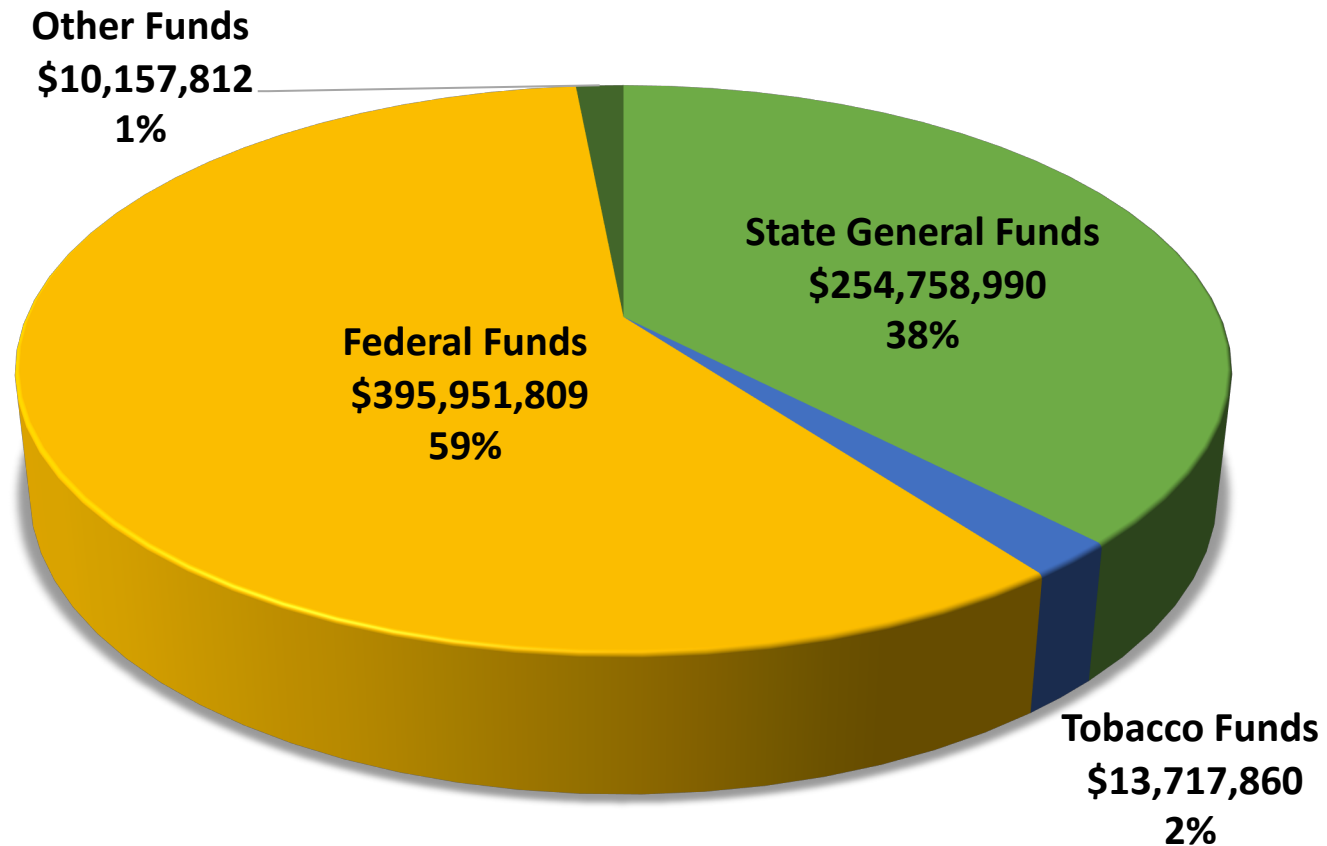
